

- Exposition: The world & character(s) as they are
- Inciting incident: The catalyst of the story
- Plot Point 1: A decision
- Midpoint: A major twist
- Plot Point 2: All is lost
- Climax: A battle
- Resolution: The wrap up



THE WIZARD OF OZ

Exposition:

- Dorothy dislikes her home life. Inciting incident:
- The tornado whisks Dorothy away.

Plot Point 1:

• Dorothy decides to follow the Yellow Brick Road to find the Wizard.

Midpoint:


• The Wizard is a fake who can't help Dorothy.

Plot Point 2

- Dorothy is captured by the witch.
- Climax:
- Dorothy melts the witch.

Resolution:

• Dorothy returns to Kansas, now understanding that there's no place like home.

UTILIZING MEANINGFUL ACTION

Meaningless action: Any action that doesn't add a deeper meaning to the scene.

Meaningful action: Any action that causes the reader to experience the most important meaning of the scene on a deeper level.

- Ask yourself, "What is the best action for this scene?"
- Example: A man and woman are discussing their future as a couple. She wants to get married and he's hedging
